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## From Mayor Michele Hodges

As we continue to shape the future of Grosse Pointe Park, I'm pleased to share a few recent highlights that reflect our City's progress and the spirit

of collaboration that makes our community so special.

Last month, we hosted a Charlevoix Streetscape Community Engagement Bar Crawl—a unique and energetic event that brought residents and business owners together to discuss the future of Charlevoix Street in a casual, lively setting. Your input during this event is helping us shape a more vibrant, pedestrian-friendly corridor, and we're excited to build on that momentum in the months ahead.

Council recently adopted two significant planning and zoning initiatives: a new Short-Term Rental Ordinance and a comprehensive rewrite of our Zoning Ordinance. As we celebrate these achievements, we also pause to remember and honor the extraordinary life of Brian Colter, our longtime City Forester, who recently passed away. Brian served Grosse Pointe Park with unwavering dedication for over three decades, guiding our urban forestry program with deep expertise and heartfelt care. A graduate of both the University of Michigan and Michigan State University, Brian was a certified arborist, a passionate advocate for environmental stewardship, and a respected leader statewide. His legacy includes maintaining our Tree City USA status for 42 consecutive years, earning the rare Sterling Community designation, planting a record 340 municipal trees in 2024 alone, and nurturing partnerships through his service with the Beautification Commission, Keep Michigan Beautiful, and the Arboriculture Society of Michigan Foundation. Brian's tireless efforts helped grow not only our city's tree canopy, but also our sense of pride and place. He will be deeply missed, and his impact will continue to be felt for generations to come.

Thank you for your continued involvement and support. Together, we are building a stronger Grosse Pointe Park—one step, one conversation, and one decision at a time.

# An Update from the Department of Public Works

## **T**rash Talk: Rubbish and Yard Waste in Grosse Pointe Park Yard Waste Pick-Up

Yard Waste Pick-Up began March 31, on your designated trash day. Please make sure all yard waste (including all sticks, twigs, and brush) is in paper bags or in properly labeled waste containers. Branches larger than 4 feet should be put out for chipping.

### **Citywide Chipping**

Citywide Chipping begins the first full week of April (starting April 7). If a holiday falls within this week, chipping will be delayed until the following week. The city will collect branches ranging from 1 to 4 inches in diameter.

Kindly ensure that all branches are placed neatly and uniformly at the street.

Priority Waste will continue to collect yard waste on your designated trash day through the end of November.

### **Shred Day**

The City of Grosse Pointe Park will host a Shred Day at the Windmill Park parking lot on Saturday, May 3, 2025, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Residents are invited to bring sensitive and confidential documents for secure, on-site shredding at the time of drop-off. This service is free for residents. A valid park pass or driver's license is required for Park residents.

### **E-Waste Drop Off Day (Electronic Waste)**

The City of Grosse Pointe Park will host an E-Waste drop off day October 25, 2025, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Windmill Park parking lot. More details to come.

### **Need a new recycling bin or rubbish bin?**

To order a new bin, call the City of Grosse Pointe Park at (313) 822-5100 ext. 204. Rubbish bins are \$100, and recycling bins are \$75. Once your order is placed, please allow up to two weeks for delivery. The bin will be delivered to your driveway, and you will receive an invoice for the amount due.

## **Questions & Concerns: My Water Bill**

**Understanding Billing Cycles:** The City is divided into two billing cycles: Cycle 1 and Cycle 2. Your assigned cycle determines when you will receive your bill and its due date. Water bills are calculated in 60-day cycles and issued every two months. Additionally, we bill

in arrears, meaning that your payment reflects water usage from a previous period.

**Why is my bill so high?** Is it Spring or Summer time? Do you have a sprinkling system? Do you have a toilet running? All of these factors may play a part. Spring into late summer can be higher than normal usage months. Running sprinkling systems and watering flowers can also increase usage. Running toilets can create high usage. This is something that can be easily missed. If you suspect this could be an issue, a simple way to confirm can be to drop a few drops of food coloring into the toilet tank and see if it runs into the bowl. If it does, you may want to have a professional take a look.

Other small leaks, although not significant, can lead to higher than normal usage.

**Estimations and why we do it.** Occasionally, the city needs to estimate your bill. This can happen due to various reasons, such as staffing shortages or software issues. Estimations ensure that billing remains consistent even when circumstances prevent actual readings.

**How are bills estimated?** Estimated bills are calculated based on an average. This average is typically derived from the same period a year ago, providing an estimate for the billing amount. Occasionally, this average may be higher than expected. When this occurs, the next bill—based on actual usage—will adjust accordingly. This means that any overestimated amount will be subtracted, or, conversely, an underestimation might result in an additional charge.

## **Our City Workers: Give Them Time and Space to Update Our Aging Infrastructure**

Our city workers play a crucial role in maintaining and improving the infrastructure we all rely on—roads, water lines, and city properties. As they work to upgrade and repair these essential services, it's important for all of us to do our part by giving them the time and space they need to work safely.

When you see our crews on the road or in your neighborhood, slow down, follow posted detours, and stay alert. These workers are improving our city for everyone, and their safety depends on our cooperation.

## Marina Notes

**T**he Windmill Pointe Park Marina will be opening for the season on **Tuesday, April 15, 2025.**

All wells will be receiving a fresh coat of paint to make the well numbers more easily identifiable. Pier 1 wells will go from 105-166.

Plans for the marina renovation are moving forward, and we believe we have a workable plan. All safety equipment is in place other than emergency ladders. Fourteen new safety ladders will also be added to the marina this season.

Water levels will be lower to start the season with the hope of the water rising about 12 inches by the end of May.

For boaters looking to get a pump out, you will need to stop by the inside gatehouse or call (313) 822-2812 ext. 400 to coordinate a date and time to schedule your pump out.

# Election Reminders

## Local Election - November 4, 2025

The City Clerk is responsible for administering all elections. For the most up-to-date information, visit the Michigan Voter Information Center website.

You are qualified to vote in Michigan if:

- You are a citizen of the United States.
- You are at least 18 years of age by election day.
- You are a resident of Michigan and at least a 30-day resident of the city or township where you are applying to register to vote by election day.

The Saturday before each election, the clerk's office will be open for 8 hours, also posted on the Michigan Voter Information Center website.

**July 22, 2025:** Deadline for filing Nominating Petitions.

**September 20, 2025:** UOCAVA Ballots will be mailed out.

**September 25, 2025:** Absentee Ballots will be mailed out.

**October 20, 2025:** Deadline to register to vote by mail or online and to be eligible to vote in the November Election.

### How to Register to Vote

- Download and complete the Michigan Voter Registration Application (PDF), and return it to the City Clerk in-person or by mail.
- Visit any Secretary of State branch location.
- Register online at the Michigan Voter Information Center.
- Within 14 days of an election, those who wish to register to vote or update their voter registration must do so in person at the City Clerk's office.
- Michigan allows for same-day voter registration, meaning that qualified electors can register and vote up to and on Election Day. Voters may register or update their voter registration in person at the City Clerk's office on Election Day.

Full text of the ballot, including the proposals, may be obtained at Michigan Voter Information Center website. All electors who are registered with the Clerk in the city in which they reside are eligible to vote at this election. Sample ballots can also be found at the Michigan Voter Information Center website. To comply with the Help America Vote Act, voting instructions will be available in audio format and in Braille. Arrangements for obtaining these alternative formats can be made by contacting the City Clerk. All polling locations are accessible for voters with disabilities.

All registered voters have the option to vote absentee. If you would like to receive an absentee ballot, please contact the City Clerk's office at (313) 822-6200. If you are interested in serving as an Election Inspector, complete the Election Worker Application (PDF) and return it to the Clerk's Office.

## Chief's Corner

Technology advancements have led to increased threats against your personal and financial information. Cybercriminals and fraudsters are looking for new methods to take control of identities and empty bank accounts. As your Director of Public Safety, I must stress how crucial it is to protect your personal data so that you don't become a victim of identity theft.



### Be Vigilant Against Scams

Here are some common schemes used to trick people out of their personal information.

#### Phishing Emails and Calls

Scammers impersonate legitimate businesses or government organizations to obtain sensitive personal information from unsuspecting individuals.

#### Fake Websites and Apps

Scammers create fake websites and applications which look like legitimate platforms to steal user login credentials.

#### Social Engineering Attacks

Criminals use trust-building techniques to trick victims into revealing their personal information.

#### Protect Yourself!

Do not provide personal or financial information through phone or email communications without first confirming the recipient is authentic. Always verify the origin of links and attachments before interacting with them to avoid security risks.

### How to Strengthen Your Online Security

#### Use Strong, Unique Passwords

Create complex passwords and change them regularly. Consider using a password manager.

#### Enable Multi-Factor Authentication

Multi-Factor Authentication provides additional protection for your online accounts.

#### Keep Software Updated

Protect against vulnerabilities by maintaining updated versions of your operating system, applications and security software.

#### Monitor Your Bank Statements and Credit Reports

Check your transactions for any unauthorized or suspicious activity.

#### More Tips

Use secure payment methods. Avoid using public Wi-Fi for online banking and shred sensitive documents. Report any authorized or suspicious activity to your bank and if you suspect you are a victim of identity theft, contact Public Safety. Stay safe and stay protected!

## From the desk of the City Manager

### *Pardon Our Dust*

As we move into spring, I want to take a moment to share a few important updates about ongoing and upcoming infrastructure projects that reflect the City's continued investment in improving public safety, enhancing quality of life, and maintaining the long-term vitality of our community.

#### **Jefferson Avenue Sanitary Sewer Separation Project**

The City is making significant progress on the Jefferson Avenue Sanitary Sewer Separation project. This critical infrastructure effort is aimed at reducing combined sewer overflows and improving overall system performance during wet weather events. Construction crews are currently working along key segments of Jefferson Avenue to separate stormwater from sanitary flows, a long-term investment in protecting our environment and complying with state and federal regulations.

#### **Citywide Sidewalk Replacement Program**

Our sidewalk replacement program is well underway, with a focus on replacing aging, broken, or uneven sidewalk panels throughout the City. This effort not only improves walkability and accessibility for all residents but also enhances neighborhood aesthetics and safety. Thank you for your patience as crews work their way through each area, ensuring that our community remains a safe and welcoming place for pedestrians. Work started in District 1 in 2024, and District 2 is next up for 2025.

#### **Ongoing Sewer System Cleaning and Televising**

Maintaining a reliable sewer system is a top priority. The Department of Public Works continues its proactive cleaning and televising of sewer lines throughout the City. This process helps identify potential issues before they become costly problems, ensuring the system remains in good condition and operates efficiently. By investing in preventative maintenance, we can reduce the risk of backups and extend the life of our underground infrastructure.

# CITY Chipping

The city chipper will operate once a month on your designated trash day during the first full week of each month \*.

#### Starting Date

April 7th, 2025

#### Frequency

Monthly (first full week\*)

#### Pickup Day

Your regular trash day

#### What to Expect

- The city pickup service will collect branches ranging from 1 to 4 inches in diameter.
- Priority Waste will continue weekly yard waste collection (beginning March 31st) on your designated trash day, accepting small sticks (under 1 inch), brush, and grass.

\*If the first full week includes a holiday, pickup will be moved to the following week to avoid any delays.

#### **2025 Paving Program**

This year's program will include the resurfacing Charlevoix Street (Three Mile to Berkshire) as well as repaving the rear parking lot at Windmill Pointe Park. City Council awarded the bid for this item at its April 14 meeting and construction will begin in summer 2025.

#### **2025 Water Main Replacement Program**

Reliable water service is essential, and we are continuing our multi-year plan to replace aging water mains. The 2025 Water Main Replacement Program will replace the water

main on Beaconsfield from Jefferson to Essex as well as install a new water main on Charlevoix street in advance of the Charlevoix streetscape project scheduled to begin in spring of 2026.

These initiatives represent our commitment to maintaining and upgrading the City's infrastructure in a thoughtful, strategic manner. I'm grateful for your continued support and patience as we work to keep Grosse Pointe Park a strong, safe, and vibrant place to live.

# Summer 2025 Tax Updates

Summer taxes are due to begin collection at City Hall on July 1, 2025, and are payable to the City of Grosse Pointe Park.

- The City Charter was amended on November 7, 2023, by the voters of Grosse Pointe Park, approving the city administration's proposed revision to extend the summer tax bill due date from August 31 to September 14.
- September 14 falls on a weekend in 2025, making all summer taxes payable without interest on the next business day if received at City Hall by 4:30 p.m. on or before September 15, 2025.

Various payment options have been provided to ensure payment is able to be made timely:

- By using our online services with the use of a credit card or ACH by visiting the link or QR code below
- U.S. mail service delivery must be no later than September 15, postmarks are NOT accepted.
- In person at the City Treasurer's Office cashier counter or by using the city payment drop box by 4:30 p.m.
- If using your banking institutions Online Bill Direct pay service (which is no cost to the customer), please be sure to use your parcel number as the account number when making payment.
- Summer taxes become past due on September 16, 2025, and will be assessed a 1% monthly interest rate.

## Summer Tax Deferment

Application for the Deferment of Summer Taxes for applicants that meet the qualifications under MCL 211.51(3) can be found on the City's website under the Department of Treasury.

- Applicants can populate the State fillable application online or pick up the State of Michigan application at the City Treasurer's office.
- Application cannot be made by phone.
- Applications MUST BE signed by the principal resident or their power of attorney.
- Applications MUST BE returned to the Treasury's office with their signed and filed 2023 State of Michigan Homestead Property Tax Credit &/or 2023 IRS 1040 Income tax return no later than 4:30 p.m. on September 16 to be applicable.
- Applicants must meet the requirements of form 471:
  - o Income does not exceed \$40,000.

- o Property is your Principal Residence (where you live).

- o You meet one of the six criteria under the Principal Residence section, or you meet section two (2) of the application.

- If you need a State of Michigan application mailed to you, contact the Treasury office.
- Eligible applicants will have until February 14, 2026, to pay the summer balance without interest or incur interest.
- Applicants who do not meet all the eligibility criteria will be denied.
- If applicants submit the form and do NOT meet the eligibility criteria and/or have NOT provided the proper supporting documentation for "total" household income (all sources) not exceeding \$40,000 making the summer taxes due on or before the September 15, 2025, since September 14 falls on a Sunday this year.

## Past Due: Summer and Winter 2024 Property Taxes

February 28, 2025 was the last day the City of Grosse Pointe Park collected 2024's Summer or Winter Taxes.

- The Wayne County Treasurer's Office is now collecting 2024 delinquent taxes on real property located within Wayne County.
- The City of Grosse Pointe Park cannot accept payments for last year's real estate tax bills.
- Property taxes not paid to the local Treasurer's office by the last day in February (February 28, 2025) have been surrendered to Wayne County, on March 1, 2025 (as prescribed by law).
- Past due 2024 Summer and Winter taxes are both due and payable to the Wayne County Treasurer's office.
- Residents may get their past due balances from Wayne County by visiting their website at <https://pat.waynecounty.com/Home/>
- To reach the Wayne County Treasurer's office, call (313) 224-5990 during normal business hours (8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.).
- Residents can look up their current balance owed to Wayne County by searching for their property address or Parcel ID number.
- Wayne County provides residents with the ability to make payment online, by using their mobile application, or by using one of their kiosks locations.
- Having trouble paying your past due summer or winter taxes, Wayne County also offers payment plans. On the website, click on "Payment Options" and the links provided to find out more about their payment plan

information.

## Water & Sewer Utility Billing

Each location throughout the city with a water meter receives a bimonthly invoice containing user charges for water, sewer, and recycling collection fees.

- Invoices are created for the billing cycle on the 10th of the month.
- Residents/customers have a month to make payment without penalty, by the 10th of the month following the invoice date (30 days).
- Customers have various options available to them to make timely payments.
- Payment methods not only include making your payment at the Treasury office during normal business hours, but also using the city hall payment drop box or one of many different electronic payment options now available to each customer.
- The city's authorized fee schedule includes a \$30 insufficient fee for any draft checks returned to the city for bad checks and will be assessed to the customer's invoice to cover costs.

## Electronic Payment Options

Residents/customers are now able to access not only their invoice information using our online services, but also make electronic payment.

- Bsaonline.com
- Enroll in the ACH option at \$2.25 per invoice processed or \$13.50 annually for utility billing and \$4.50 annually for the Summer and Winter tax payments.
- Credit card/Digital Wallet at 3% merchant service (fee retained by the merchant not the city) with a minimum fee of \$2.95 reduced from the prior merchant vendor with a minimum fee of 3.5% (and above based on the payment balances) up to 7%.
- Text to pay options.
- Scheduled payment options.
- Paperless enrollment for Utility Bills and Tax Bills; however, tax bills will still be sent out in the mail as required. Please be sure to notify the City Assessor's Office of any changes to your mailing address.
- Online invoice enrollment provides our customers with invoice reminders and past due notifications.
- Online Bill Direct payment (no charge) through your personal banking institution by using your invoice four digit "Account Number," not the location identification number on your invoice.
